Before You Go...



Medications:

- Place medications in your carry-on. (DO NOT PACK IT IN YOUR CHECKED BAGS)
- Always carry extra dosages.
- Medication should be in the original containers.

Travel Documents

- Carry your Travel Documents with you when traveling.
- Upon arrival, lock them in a safe deposit box in your hotel or stateroom.
- Keep a copy of your documents at home and a copy with you during your travels.

LOOKING AFTER YOUR MONEY

Petty crime and theft, particularly in cities, are a fact of modern life all over the world. Tourists are often seen as an easy target so it makes sense to take these simple precautions

- Do not carry all your cash in one pocket or bag. Keep all your credit cards separately
- Use a small pack carried on the front of your body; this is less of a target than if worn on the back.
- Leave valuables like your passport, extra cash/travelers' checks in your hotels safe or safety deposit box if available (unless you require your passport on an excursion).
- Keep a separate record of the number on your passport, travelers' checks and credit card emergency number should you need to report them stolen or lost.
- When carrying a handbag, we strongly advise you not to keep valuables inside the bag and that it is worn across the body and held at the front with the opening concealed.
- In the event of any attempted theft, do not put up any resistance.

LOST PROPERTY

- Before leaving your aircraft, hotel and bus please check that you have all your belongings and that nothing has been overlooked i.e. under your bed, in the bathroom, or finally underneath the coach seat.
- When traveling with a group, particularly in the larger cities, there is a risk of loss or theft of personal belongings, not only from hotels but also whilst traveling around.
- As with any large city you should be aware of the problem of pickpockets, as tourists are very susceptible.
- It is important to have good travel insurance cover and additionally, to leave expensive items at home.

U.S. Department of State Worldwide Travel Alert

The U.S. Department of State has issued a Worldwide Travel Alert

The State Department advises that U.S. Citizens should exercise vigilance when in public places or using transportation.

Please be aware of their immediate surroundings, and avoid large crowds or crowded places.

Since the alert is not location or event specific and State Department representatives indicated that there was no specific threat against U.S. Citizens. The alert is guidance for U.S. Citizens to be more cognizant of their surroundings due to recent events.

These suggested actions are the same common-sense measures recommended to all guests when travelling.

The safety and security of guests is the highest priority, therefore Security Departments, staffed with former Military, Intelligence and Law Enforcement Professionals, maintains close contact with Governmental Authorities, Local Law Enforcement Agencies and Private Sources for security assessments, information, and continues to monitor these alerts Worldwide.
